As well as being the world's most important natural laboratory, the Antarctic is a place of great beauty and wonder. Its frozen wastes have fired the public imagination for generations, and around 30,000 tourists now visit the Antarctic each year to experience what life is like in the Earth's last great wilderness.





We shall transfer from Gippsland to Melbourne Airport to depart on our flight to Santiago de Chile. On arrival we will be met by our guide and transferred to our hotel, CUMBRES LASTARRIA, *or similar*, for a 2-night stay. Dinner tonight will be at a local restaurant.

Sprawled across Chile's central valley tucked between high Andean peaks and the coastal cordillera, lies the cosmopolitan city of Santiago de Chile or Santiago for short. It was founded in 1541 and named Santiago del Nuevo Extremo, "Santiago of the New Frontier' by Spanish conqueror Pedro de Valdivia who also became Chile's first royal governor. The shaded Plaza de Armas is the cities heart framed by some of Chile's impressive colonial buildings such as the Metropolitan Cathedral, the Governor's Palace and the Historical Musuem. The spectacular Parque Metropolitano is home to the city's zoo and botanical gardens. It is also one of the world's largest city parks.

Friday 13 February

Santiago

(B D)

This morning, we depart the hotel for a walking sightseeing tour of the city of Santiago. The tour combines conversation and walking through the main cultural points of the city in a unique experience.

We will hear interesting stories about Chilean culture, and explore downtown Santiago with stops at the Fine Arts Museum, Cerro Santa Lucia, the Central Market, and the Plaza de Armas, the Financial District, the Presidential Palace and Paris-London neighborhood. Dinner tonight will be at a local restaurant.



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Saturday 14, Sunday 15, Monday 16 FebruarySantiago – Puerto Natales(B L D) x3We depart Santiago this morning and fly to Puerto Natales.On arrival we will travel by coach to theTorres Del Paine National Park, where we will stay at the LAGO GREY HOTEL, or similar, for the nextthree nights.

Torres del Paine National Park is South America's most famous park and a UNESCO World Biosphere Reserve. It is best recognised for its magnificent central massif, sculptured by glaciers into unmistakable cuernos (horns) and torres (towers). Rising from the sea to over 3353 metres, these granite spires are truly impressive. Varied and abundant wildlife including guanacos, elusive pumas, and dozens of bird species roam here, making this Patagonia's top adventure destination.

During our time in Torres del Paine National Park Natales, we will participate in several walking excursions as well as driving tours that will highlight its natural wonders, outdoor activities, and essential travel adventures.



Tuesday 17 February

Puerto Natales - Punta Arenas

(B D)

This morning, we will travel by road to Punta Arenas. On arrival, we will be met by a representative of Aurora Expeditions and transferred to our hotel for an overnight stay.

Overlooking the Straits of Magellan, the city sits astride one of the world's most historic trade routes. Today, Punta Arenas reflects a great blend of cultural backgrounds, from English sheep ranchers to

Portuguese sailors. It remains an utterly fascinating testament to Chile's rich history. Modern day Punta Arenas is home to many popular restaurants, and bars, offering a mix of local and international fare.

Tonight, we meet our fellow expeditioners at a voyage briefing where we will reconfirm transfer times for tomorrow, explain the procedures for our flight to King George Island and outline important IAATO regulations for visitors to Antarctica.



Wednesday 18 February (EMBARKATION) Punta Arenas – King George Island (B L D)

This morning, we will be transferred to Punta Arenas airport for our charter flight to King George Island, Antarctica (weather permitting). The flight will take approximately one hour and forty-five minutes. On arrival into King George Island the expedition team is on hand to greet us and to prepare us for the Zodiac transfer to the vessel. You will have time to settle into your cabin before our important safety briefings.

Note: King George Island is located at the northern part of the Antarctic Peninsula in the South Shetland Islands and is one of the most remote places on Earth. A clear sky with perfect visibility is required for safe take-off and landing.

Thursday 19 to Thursday 26 FebruaryWeddell Sea & Antarctic Peninsula(B L D) x8It is almost impossible to describe the feeling of arriving in Antarctica. Spotting your first iceberg and
taking a deep breath of some of the most fresh, crisp air on earth is an experience that will stay with you
forever.

Once we arrive, the western side of the Antarctic Peninsula and the South Shetland Islands are ours to explore, and we have a host of choices available to us. Because we are so far south, we will experience approximately 18-24 hours of daylight and the days can be as busy as you wish.

Your experienced expedition team, who have made countless journeys to this area, will use their expertise to design your voyage from day to day, choosing the best options based on the prevailing weather, ice conditions and wildlife opportunities.

We generally make landings or Zodiac excursions twice a day. You will want to rug up before joining Zodiac cruises along spectacular ice cliffs or among grounded icebergs, keeping watch for whales, seals and porpoising penguins. Zodiacs will also transport you from the ship to land, where you can visit penguin rookeries, discover historic huts, and explore some of our favourite spots along the peninsula.

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While ashore we aim to stretch our legs, wandering along pebbly beaches or perhaps up snow-covered ridgelines to vantage points with mountains towering overhead and ice-speckled oceans below. If you have chosen an optional activity, you will have the option to do that whenever conditions allow, and of course keen polar plungers will have the chance to fully immerse themselves in polar waters - conditions permitting!

In addition to Zodiac cruises and shore excursions, we may cruise some of the narrow, dramatic straits separating offshore islands from the mainland, or linger in scenic bays to watch whales travelling or feeding. This is a great time to enjoy the observation lounge for uninterrupted views of Antarctica in all its splendour. Keep an ear out for the creak and deep rumble of glaciers as they carve their way from summit to sea. Take a quiet moment to experience the wonder of this incredible white continent.

Central to the story of where Sir Ernest Shackleton's ship, the Endurance became trapped in formidable sea ice, the Weddell Sea certainly is high on the list for many polar adventurers. A small set of islands standing off to the east of the Antarctic Peninsula collectively form the Antarctic Sound – the gateway to the Weddell Sea.

With a well-deserved reputation as being an iceberg alley where large icebergs try to escape the Weddell Sea through Antarctic Sound, often making navigation difficult. However, the rewards can be great. Fossils are a reminder of a more temperate era – gastropods, large clams, and spiral-shaped ammonites, all turned to stone.



We hope to experience memorable wildlife encounters as the Weddell boasts a large Adélie penguin colony just outside of Antarctic Sound, some of which breed on the rocky slopes of a small volcanic island, where a large colony of Antarctic blue-eyed shags jostle for space with nest-building Wilson's storm petrels.

On thrilling Zodiac excursions or slicing a path through the maze of sea ice in your kayak, keep watch for chinstrap and gentoo penguins in and out of the water, as well as humpback, minke and orca whales. Your camera is sure to get a solid workout during your time in the Weddell Sea.



Friday 27, Saturday 28 FebruaryDrake Passage Crossing(B L D) x2Enjoy a final morning landing in the South Shetland Islands before we enter the Drake Passage for our
return journey to South America.(B L D) x2

With lectures and film presentations to complete our Antarctic experience, there is still plenty of time to enjoy the magic of the Southern Ocean and the life that calls it home. There is time for reflection and discussion about what we have seen and experienced. We hope you become ambassadors for Antarctica telling your family, friends and colleagues about your journey to this magical place, advocating for its conservation and preservation so that they might one day visit the region to experience what you have been lucky to see and do here.

As we approach the tip of South America, our Captain may sail close to legendary Cape Horn, weather and time permitting.



Sunday 1 March (DISEMBARKATION)

Ushuaia - Buenos Aires

(B D)

During the early morning, we cruise up the Beagle Channel, before quietly slipping into dock in Ushuaia, where we will be free to disembark around 8.00 am. We then farewell the expedition team and transfer to the airport for our flight to Buenos Aires. On arrival, we shall be met and transferred to our hotel, INTERSUR RECOLETA, *or similar*, for the next two nights. Dinner tonight will be at a local restaurant.

Buenos Aires is the Argentine Republic's capital city. Located on the southern bank of the River Plate, the population of greater Buenos Aires is around 13.5 million people and has been virtually rebuilt since the beginning of this century with very few of the old buildings remaining. The centre of Buenos Aires has maintained the original layout since foundation and the Plaza de Mayo is its heart.



Monday 2 March

Buenos Aires

(B D)

This morning we drive down 9de Julio Ave, the widest avenue in the world, past the famous Colon Opera House, the Obelisk, commemorating the first founding of the city in 1536 to get to Plaza de Mayo (May Square). We will also see the surrounding buildings; Government House, the Metropolitan Cathedral with the Mausoleum of General San Martin, Argentina's greatest national hero and the Cabildo, the colonial town hall built in 1751. Then we will head to La Boca, the typically Italian district where the first Italian immigrants settled and 'Caminito' street.

The tour continues to the Buenos Aires port area, past San Martin Square towards the residential district of Palermo Chico and Palermo Park with its jacaranda and palo borracho trees which flower in the spring and late summer. The ride continues to Recoleta elegant district to visit the Recoleta Cemetery where the famous are laid to rest (including Eva Peron). We will return to the hotel along the stylish Alvear Ave.

On our last night in Buenos Aires, we will get a taste of Argentina's local cuisine with an interactive Argentine Dining Experience, designed to give you an introduction to the best of Argentine cuisine and culture. This is NOT a cooking class, but a fun and unique experience, where you will meet and dine with people from all over the world.

An international team of guides are on hand to spoil you and take you through every step of this culinary journey: Master the art of correctly closing empanadas before sitting down to a meal of authentic Argentine cuisine, paired with four boutique wines. Finish by learning how to prepare 'maté' paired with alfajores. We will meet and eat with fellow foodie travellers from all over the world.

Pair this with her interior comforts and extensive menu of active off-ship excursions and you have the perfect package for an expedition experience.





Gippsland Travel may receive fees, commissions, gifts or financial incentives from third party supplier/s under this contract.

LATE BOOKINGS

Higher deposit payments are required for late bookings. A guarantee of full payment is required at the time of booking for all bookings received within 4 weeks of departure.

PASSPORT and VISA

A valid passport is required for all international travel.

If you do not hold an Australian passport, you may require a resident return visa. Some countries require a visa to be issued before you depart Australia. Gippsland Travel will advise you of all passport and visa requirements for this tour. The Australian Government through the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade regularly updates travel advice on various destinations. Force majeure includes, but is not limited to: acts of God, accident, riots, war, terrorist act, epidemic, pandemic, quarantine, outbreaks of infectious disease or any other public health crisis, civil commotion, breakdown of communication facilities, natural catastrophes and natural disasters (including but not limited to flooding, fire, earthquake, landslide), adverse weather conditions, high or low water levels; government directed travel restrictions or omissions, changes in laws or regulations, national strikes, explosion, generalised lack of availability of raw materials or energy, nuclear or other industrial accident causing environmental pollution or contamination; change in law, meaning, enactment, amendment (including repeal) in the law or administration of any law in Australia or any jurisdiction or territory relevant to the booking contract, which includes changes in statute, regulation, determination, by-law, declaration, licence and the common law as applicable from time to time.

For the avoidance of doubt, Force Majeure shall not include (a) financial distress nor inability of either party to make a profit or avoid a financial loss, (b) changes in market prices or conditions, or (c) a party's financial inability to perform its obligations hereunder.
